Thank you for considering the Rochester Hills Museum at Van Hoosen Farm for this grant request to the MCACA for Exhibit Fabrication funding.

1. Artistic/Cultural Merit

Describe the project for which you are requesting MCACA support In 2016, the Rochester Hills Museum at Van Hoosen Farm collaborated with Detroit PBS to create a 55-minute PBS movie – *Pioneer Family* – *On Van Hoosen Farm*. This privately financed production, filmed over six months, tells the family story of our Museum's facility. Our cultural facility tells the story of the Taylor family that came to our community in 1823 and then stayed for five generations. The marriage of Sarah Taylor to Joshua Van Hoosen in 1854 merges these two families. Members of the family were part of Michigan's constitution convention in 1837, constructed and operated the water-powered mills, ministered at the local Baptist Church, created several local businesses, platted the surrounding Village of Stoney Creek (listed on the National Register of Historic Places), started the Masonic Lodge, and served on the local school board.

Two of the women are most noted. Dr. Bertha Van Hoosen (1863 – 1952) was a worldrenowned surgeon. Considered the best-known woman doctor in the world when she died in 1955 at 92 years old. She was an early graduate of the University of Michigan medical school and spent her entire life learning and then teaching/mentoring other female doctors. She founded the American Medical Women's Association (AMWA) and served as its first president. Her niece, Dr. Sarah Van Hoosen Jones was the fifth and final generation on this farm. She earned an MS in Animal Husbandry and a Ph.D. in Animal Genetics. She served on the Michigan State University Board of Trustees from 1944-1955. Fluent in five languages, she sold her purebred Holstein cattle to breeding programs in Argentina, Venezuela, and Costa Rica and was the first woman Master Farmer in Michigan. Under her leadership, the Van Hoosen Farm was well recognized in the US for its breeding operation. Upon her death in 1972, she willed her farm, numerous residential homes, and 350 acres to Michigan State University.

The PBS movie helped to tell this story through a visual production. Our grant request is planned to strategically accomplish two goals:

- 1) To tell the powerful story of the Taylor and Van Hoosen families and their ability to overcome hardship, endure discrimination as women in professional fields, to be examples of the powerful impact when you are active in your community and invested in your family. Our exhibits will tell the story of both the men and women of this family and recognize them as positive role models for all guests.
- 2) The Rochester Hills Museum also serves as the local history Museum for the greater Rochester/Rochester Hills Community. Our new exhibits and interactive displays will interpret our community's 200-year history (founded in 1817) with exhibits that focus on land use/watersheds, Native Americans, sustainability, transportation, and local businesses.

Our funding request is for only a portion of the total project. We will be matching this grant with private funds and City of Rochester Hills funds to leverage the full amount of funding needed to create the exhibits that tell a national story.

Our intention is to create exhibits that inspire and empower our guests so they leave with a sense of hope and optimism - using our location and stories as their inspiration.

Our current exhibits are over 20 years old and include no technology or interactives. With new research, several new publications on the Taylor-Van Hoosen families and local history, and the recent PBS movie, we are excited to launch forward to create new permanent exhibits that tell our story. We are seeking a shared collaboration with MCACA to help us to tell our story to a broad, regional audience.

In 2017, the Rochester Hills Museum utilized private funds to complete all conceptual design work for these exhibits. Our grant-funding request is to now complete design and fabrication for all exhibits.

Describe how the project will use qualified appropriate artists

The Rochester Hills Museum at Van Hoosen Farm has selected Flutter and Wow Museum Exhibit Designers, a Michigan Based company, through a competitive bid process that follows our City's purchasing ordinance. Flutter and Wow designs combine educational and historic properties with a visual artist presence that is unique in the museum world. These displays are so memorable because of this visual artistic flair, which produces the benefits of art and education at the same time. Mr. Stevens (see Bio), the primary exhibit designer has been involved in the artist design of prominent artistic displays at the Detroit Institute of Arts, Mid-America Arts Alliance, Great Lakes Children's Museum, and San Antonio Museum of Art. This unique style is shown in Sample 4 - Museum Design Display attachment.

Explain how your project provide experiences for audiences/participants to express themselves, grow, further their well-being, or be more happy

Our exhibits will be designed and fabricated to create durable, professional, and thought provoking panels. Our exhibits will ask questions, allow interaction, utilize social media, and "talk back" boards that allow guests to interact with each other - asking questions and sharing their life experiences. We intend for these exhibits to be intergenerational and appealing to all age groups. In addition, they will meet curriculum objectives for Grade Level Content Expectations (GLCE) through the State of Michigan allowing grades K-4 to visit our site and enhance and complement their classroom teaching. These new exhibits will also complement our existing video space in one our 1927 silos that allows guests to choose over 20 short videos about local history.

Our goal is to have our guests leave refreshed, optimistic, joyful, and empowered.

2. <u>Community Impact</u>

Demonstrate Community Support

The impetus for this project was the creation of our PBS movie in 2016. Three private family foundations funded the video production. When it premiered, over 400 people attended at a local Emagine Theater where two screens were donated for our use. The private funding for the City portion of this exhibit fabrication project comes from the Community Foundation of Greater Rochester where over 250 Museum members and 350 additional donors financially support the Museum every year. Our community invests over 8,000 volunteer hours in the Museum every year.

Describe how your project will draw or serve a wide-ranging audience

The Rochester Hills Museum story is a regional story, with national and international connections that will inspire local residents and those throughout Michigan, the Midwest, and the entire United States. It will inspire women who are involved in medicine or those challenged by overcoming insurmountable odds. It will inspire philanthropists and entrepreneurs, farmers and homemakers, architects, and students. Environmentalists will marvel at the quality of water in Stoney Creek and inquire about our bio swales that filter water on our property. Gardeners will enjoy the grounds. Our property serves as a 16-acre public park that straddles the municipalities of Rochester and Rochester Hills. The historic grounds are accessible 24 hours a day and cultural programming is available year round allowing all ages and interests to enjoy.

Describe how your project will contribute to a vibrant, successful community

The Rochester Hills Museum has various multipurpose spaces that are available to our local community. We are proud of our collaborations with the City of Rochester, Rochester Garden Club, high school sport teams, various local community service clubs and more. Their events and activities utilize our buildings and grounds to enable their success. Our Museum site is well used by the cultural lovers but it is also heavily used by nontraditional guests to our site – whether it is for a local history and cultural event or a wedding ceremony, reception, awards banquet, or social gathering. Our guests are surrounded and immersed with our cultural story. We are proud that our award winning historic buildings and grounds are adaptively reused to serve as both cultural resources as well as multipurpose space for our community. The Rochester Hills Museum is well recognized for our historic preservation efforts and innovative culture.

3. <u>Implementation/Management</u>

The Rochester Hills Museum is seeking matching funds from MCACA to complement City of Rochester Hills public funds and private funds, to create 35 static interpretive panels, numerous interactives, display cases, and high quality graphics. The new exhibits are based on audience research, surveys of guests, interviews, and meetings with numerous local organizations and stakeholders. All exhibit material will be designed and fabricated in the fall of 2018 with installation in the spring, 2019. This project is expected to last 25 years.

Describe how the project will be marketed and promoted

Our new exhibits will create an outstanding opportunity for the Rochester Hills Museum to promote our story. We will use our social media outlets – Facebook and Instagram, video production capabilities through the City of Rochester Hills Media team and YouTube channel.

All Museum guests to all of our programs are provided with opportunities to link to a survey to evaluate our exhibits, their visitor experience, and ask for their suggestions and comments. Guest will also have the opportunity to use our tablets to complete our survey before they leave our site. We will evaluate every comment and compile data so we can adjust our exhibits and themes to best meet the needs of our guests.

Describe the plan to ensure accessibility for all patrons and audiences

The Rochester Hills Museum at Van Hoosen Farm is listed on the National Register of Historic Places as part of the Stoney Creek Village National Register Site. We are also a Michigan Historic Site. We are sensitive to both preserving our buildings by meeting the *Secretary of the Interiors Standards for Rehabilitation* and making them accessible to all guests.

As part of our adaptive reuse of our two farmhouses, four farm buildings, Children's Garden, and Schoolhouse, all building and restroom access meets Americans with Disabilities (ADA) Guidelines. Accommodations are available in our farmhouses. In addition, our website, newsletter, and all brochures meet ADA colors and contrast guidelines. Our PBS movie and all videos will have closed-captioned options available. Our proposed exhibits will be designed with either Braille labels or handout material for visually impaired guests.

We are committed to having our facilities, programs, and exhibits accessible to all abilities and limitations.

Organizational History and Governing Board Rochester Hills Museum at Van Hoosen Farm Exhibits

Brief Overview of our History and Purpose

History:

In 1823, Elisha Taylor led a group of 60 family members from upstate New York to Rochester, Michigan – seeking new land and opportunities. The Taylor Family established the community of Stoney Creek Village in Avon Township (City of Rochester Hills) located 25 miles north of Detroit. The Van Hoosen Family moved to this settlement in 1837 and their son Joshua married Sarah Taylor after his return from the California Gold Fields in 1852. Members of the family were part of Michigan's constitution convention in 1837, constructed and operated the water powered mills, ministered at the local Baptist Church, created several local businesses, platted the surrounding Village of Stoney Creek (listed on the National Register of Historic Places), started the Masonic Lodge, and served on the local school board.

Two of the women are most noted. Dr. Bertha Van Hoosen (1863 – 1952) was a worldrenowned surgeon. Considered the best-known woman doctor in the world when she died in 1955 at 92 years old. She was an early graduate of the University of Michigan medical school and spent her entire life learning and then teaching/mentoring other female doctors. She founded the American Medical Women's Association (AMWA) and served as its first president. Her niece, Dr. Sarah Van Hoosen Jones was the fifth and final generation on this farm. She earned an MS in Animal Husbandry and a Ph.D. in Animal Genetics. She served on the Michigan State University Board of Trustees from 1944-1955. After Sarah's death in 1972, Michigan State University made plans to sell the farm. A local group of Questers started a petition drive asking MSU to donate the 1840 Van Hoosen Farmhouse to Rochester Hills to serve as a local history Museum. The Museum was established in March 1979. Over the past forty years, the City has acquired the 1850 Red House, the Van Hoosen Farm that includes the 1927 Dairy, Calf Barn, and Bull Barns, the 1911 Milk House, and the nearby 1848 Stoney Creek Schoolhouse. The property is surrounded by 16 acres of former pasture and is bordered by Stoney Creek.

Our community is proud of the restoration of the 1840 Van Hoosen Farmhouse, the \$1.2 million adaptive reuse of the Dairy Barn, completed in 2001, and the \$600,000 adaptive reuse of the Calf Barn in 2015.

Purpose:

The Museum is part of the larger Department of Parks and Natural Resources. The Department provides support for many aspects of Museum management.

Organizational History and Governing Board Rochester Hills Museum at Van Hoosen Farm Exhibits

The Department's Mission Statement and Museum's purpose statement as approved by City Council in the Department's Strategic Plan are:

Department Mission:

"We build connections in our community: Neighbor to Neighbor; Neighbor to Nature; and Neighbor to History. We do this by preserving our history, conserving our green infrastructure, and engaging our community in the outdoors."

Museum Purpose Statement:

"To enhance understanding of the past through interpreting, preserving and collecting the history of the greater Rochester area for present and future generations."

We achieve this goal by maintaining our buildings and grounds, providing high quality cultural, educational, and recreational programs, and maintaining community archives. We are collaborative and innovative in spirit and use our resources to support our residents and their interests.

Art Activities

In May 2019, we will host the Rochester Community Schools Student Art Show and we collaborate with the nearby Paint Creek Center for the Arts providing periodic exhibit space, participating in their Art and Apples juried Art show, providing walking tours of the neighborhood surrounding their studio, and we maintain their archives at our site in a collaborative relationship.

As part of our February/March Cabin Fever Lecture series, we hosted the Michigan Opera Theater, local model wood boat builders, several independent films, and we have hosted local student bands who use our site for fundraisers and their exposure. This summer we will host our local *School of Rock – Rochester* as part of one of our summer events, as well as *Guy Louis Chautauqua Express* for a musical program in our Children's Garden. We support numerous musicians, entertainers, artists, and crafts persons at our site to support our cultural programs and to share their skills with our community.

About Rochester Hills

Rochester and Avondale Community Schools provide quality K-12 education. Local college curriculum is available at Rochester College (formerly Michigan Christian College), Oakland University and Oakland Community College. All educational levels through doctoral programs are available.

City Facilities

Recreational facilities, such as soccer, baseball, cricket, tennis, pickle ball, golf, skiing, swimming, jogging, bicycling, boating and fishing, are within easy reach at municipally supported parks. The Rochester Hills Museum at Van Hoosen Farm in historic Stoney Creek Village, Meadow Brook Hall, Meadow Brook Music Festival, Yates Cider Mill founded in 1863, a full service library, over 25 churches and a pedestrian / pathway system the length and breadth of the city are but a few of Rochester Hills features.

Rochester Hills municipal offices, a two-level structure situated on a bluff overlooking the Clinton River, blends its unique architecture with the natural habitat of an 85-acre site. The 39,000 square foot building, occupied since June of 1980, houses all city offices and a 144-seat auditorium.

Public Safety

The Fire Department provides protection for our residents and visitors relating to fire and emergency medical services. Calls for Fire and EMS related emergencies within the city are dispatched from the Oakland County Sheriff's Office in Waterford.


Around-the-clock police protection is provided by contract with Oakland County. Officers are assigned to the Rochester Hills contingent of the Oakland County Sheriff's Office and occupy the Sheriff's Substation. Crittenton Hospital, located in the city, provides health care with 24-hour emergency service. We also have an Emergency Notice system, which anyone can subscribe to through our website. This notice system will alerts subscribers via email or text, of any







A New (old) Tractor Has Been Added to the Museum's Educational Collection

A beautifully restored, operating 1949 John Deere model BW tractor arrived at the Museum as a donation from the estate of Rudolph Wegner. The tractor was purchased in 1950 and was used on the Wegner family farm in Midland, Michigan until 1959. It sold in 1965 and was used to plow snow at an automotive service station for 23 years. Rudolph's son, Dennis, repurchased the



tractor in 1988 and had it professionally restored by Duane Poach in Monticello, Minnesota in 1992. After Dennis Wegner's death in 2015, his son Gannon contacted the Rochester Hills Museum to see if we wanted it and to meet the wishes of his father - hoping the tractor could be used by a Museum in Michigan that was situated on a farm – that's us! It shipped to the Museum from Minnesota and will be used to support our programs.

The Van Hoosen Farm was slow in making the transition to mechanized farming. According to Morris Place Jr., the Van Hoosen Farm was the last farm in the area to replace their workhorses with tractors and they were the last farm in the area to purchase a hay baler. This was at the very end of

Dr. Sarah Van Hoosen Jones' management of the farm. This tractor represents the exact period when tractors appeared on this farm.

The long-term plan is to store the tractor in the Equipment Barn – once it is built. Until then, it will be stored offsite.

New Wallpaper in Dr. Bertha Van Hoosen's Bedroom

The reprinting of original wallpaper, plaster and roof repair, painting, and wallpaper installation in Dr. Bertha Van Hoosen's bedroom in the Van Hoosen Farmhouse is finally complete! Grant funding from the Rochester Junior Women's Club made this project possible. The Museum contracted with Bradbury & Bradbury Art Wallpapers to reproduce the original wallpaper design and Eco Painting completed the work. According to Van Hoosen Farm Secretary Alice Serrell, who stayed in Dr. Bertha's bedroom after she passed away in 1952, she and Dr. Sarah Van Hoosen Jones purchased the original wallpaper at Hudson's Department Store in 1952. The Museum's interpretive plan is to restore each room as it was when the last family member lived in the house in 1972.
