

PATH TO THE NAVAL ACADEMY

To prepare yourself for the Naval Academy you'll need to take 4 years of math including geometry, trigonometry, advanced algebra and, if possible pre-calculus. 4 years of English, two years of a foreign language, a year of physics, world or European history and computer instruction is also helpful. Be active in sports and extra-curricular activities.

During High School

♦ Take the ACT and SAT exams early and often. If you don't score well on one, take the other. The Naval Academy will combine the highest math and verbal scores from either test to evaluate your candidacy, and will accept results as late as February of your application year.

Starting in December of your junior year.

Complete a USNA Summer Seminar application. Summer Seminar brings over 1,000 high school students to the Naval Academy for a week during June of each summer. Students will get a first hand feel of what life is like as a midshipmen.

January - March of your junior year.

• Complete a Preliminary Application. If you meet the minimum academic standards to become a candidate for admission, a candidate packet will be mailed to you and a medical examination will be scheduled.

Beginning April of your junior year through January of your senior year.

Request a nomination from your Representative and both of your United States Senators. Many congressional members set an early fall deadline for nomination requests.

Spring of your junior year through early Fall of your senior year.

• Complete the candidate evaluation packet, medical examination, and Physical Aptitude Exam.

June of your junior year through March of your senior year.

 Consider attending a USNA Candidate Visit Weekend an opportunity to visit the "Yard" and spend a night during the academic year. October through April of your senior year

All candidates will receive final notification of their status no later than 15 April. If you don't receive an appointment, consider reapplying.

Approximately one-third of each entering class comes from either a post high school preparatory programs, such as a prep school or a university.

♦ Induction. If you have received an offer of appointment, congratulations! Each class typically enters the Naval Academy on or about 01 July. The next six weeks are spent learning how to be a midshipmen and building the foundation for the qualities and experiences that make an outstanding Naval Officer.

I was one of the first members of the National Junior Honor Society when it was brought to my school in seventh grade. We attended Honor Society meetings each month and were required to do community service throughout the school year. I received the Presidential Academic Award of Excellence last year when I graduated from St. John Lutheran School.

My interests right now are sports. I won my varsity letter in wrestling this year and am on the Lutheran High Northwest junior varsity baseball team. I enjoy singing and have been in choirs since second grade. Right now I am in three choirs—two at school and one at church. I had a great time in middle school doing the school plays each year.
