Shelby Township and Rochester Hills reach tentative agreement to 'share' employees

Shelby Township recently entered into a tentative agreement with Rochester Hills that will allow the two communities to share resources and employees in times of need.

"Rochester Hills is a community that's about the same size as Shelby Township," said Assistant Building Director Tim Wood. "They're facing similar problems, such as maintaining adequate staffing levels in light of bare bones' budget reductions."

According to Supervisor Richard Stathakis, the two communities opened the lines of communication about a year ago and managed to work out a tentative agreement that will allow Shelby Township and Rochester Hills to "loan" employees to each other at no cost, provided it's done within reason.

"Let's say my only electrical inspector wants to take a week off," Wood said. "Now, instead of hiring a employee, I can contact Rochester Hills and get it taken care of,"

The tentative agreement is currently limited to building department employees, although Stathakis sai change over time.

"This is proof that municipalities can work together for the greater good," he said. "I think we're going to see more efforts like this in the future."

The Shelby Township Board of Trustees was slated to vote on the agreement Jan. 18. It must also be approved by the Rochester Hills City Council.

Shelby Township Agrees to Share Employees with Rochester Hills

On the heels of Gov, Rick Snyder's call to local municipalities to consolidate services and share resources, the city of Rochester Hills will consider sharing some city employees — when there is a need — with Shelby Township.

The Shelby Township Board of Trustees voted this week to OK an agreement to work with Rochester Hills; the Rochester Hills City Council will consider the agreement in early February, officials there said. Both municipalities would have to agree in order for the plan to take effect.

The two communities began talking about the shared agreement nearly a year ago, according to Scott Cope, Rochester Hills Building Director.

The agreement will essentially allow either community to request personnel services from one another on an "as needed basis," at no cost.

"If one inspector goes on vacation, it would allow them (the building department) to call Shelby and ask for help and vice versa. If the inspector is available to help out, then no money would be exchanged, as long as it was a reasonable amount of time," said Cope.

The tentative agreement is currently limited to building department employees. However, Shelby Township officials have said that may change.

Cope, who runs a department of about 10 employees ranging from clerks to inspectors, said the agreement works because the two cities are comparable in size and both are facing budget cuts.

"In these economic times of ours, I think you're finally starting to think outside the box," said Shelby Township resident Ron Churchill to the trustees Tuesday. "I hope this goes further with other communities."








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Building Department Total Permits


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
Building Department Revenues

Total Building Department Revenues




