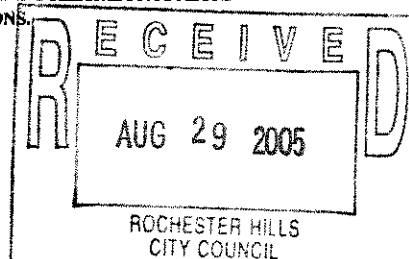

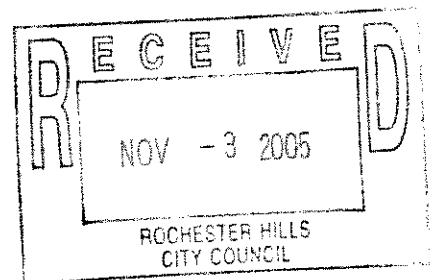
In addition to the above qualifications I have a Masters Degree in Business Administration.

City seeks grant to buy woodlands

■ Rochester Hills hopes to buy 146 acres in Rochester under deal proposed by Jaycees

The city of Rochester Hills is asking for state funds to purchase about 146 acres of woodlands in the neighboring city of Rochester.

Rochester City Manager Ken Johnson said the Jaycees never formally approached his office or the City Council to ask if they wanted the land although staff members were aware of the plan.

Johnson said he's not sure if it is a concern, but the issue will be discussed today by the Rochester City Council.

Crissman said Friday she knew nothing about the plan and she will have to discuss it with council members. Crissman did not have immediate concerns, but wanted to review the proposal.

Scott Hunter, the community development vice president for the Rochester Jaycees, said he did discuss the plan with Rochester parks Director Bruce Austin.

Hunter said Austin told him the city of Rochester doesn't have the staff to operate the land.

"We just wanted to preserve

the property," he said. "We offered it to Rochester first and then we went to Rochester Hills."

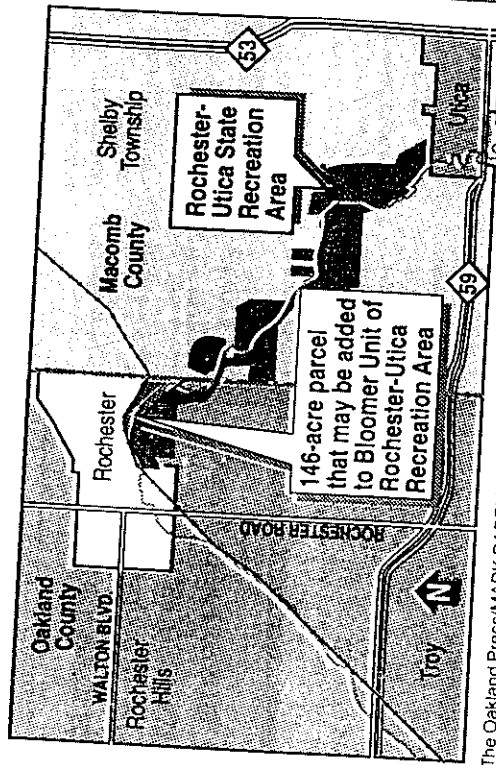
Hunter said he will attend today's meeting to discuss the proposal.

Austin said he did discuss the issue with Hunter, but thought the Jaycees would bring the issue to the Rochester council for discussion before going to Rochester Hills.

The city of Rochester Hills agreed last Wednesday to seek funding from the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund to buy the property.

Preliminary estimates are the property will cost about \$240,000, but a state assessment must be completed, according to the grant application.

The land is located on the north border of Bloomer Park, west of Dequindre along the Clinton River in south

Rochester.

The state recently turned over the Bloomer unit of the Rochester-Utica Recreation Area to Rochester Hills and this property would be added to that park land, said Mike Hartner, Rochester Hills park director.

Hartner said the land is valuable as a park because the Clinton River snakes through the property and it is close to the Paint Creek Trail.

A decision on whether the state will award the grant probably will take about 17 months, Hartner said.

Hills to add to nature area through grant from DNR

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources awarded Rochester Hills a \$375,000 grant to purchase 125 acres of wetlands near John R and the Grand Trunk Western railroad tracks.

The property, commonly referred to as Parkdale Woods, is owned by the Letica Corporation. The Clinton River runs through it, and it's home to several endangered species. The property is just north of Bloomer Park.

The DNR grant allows the land to become part of the city's nature area at no cost to taxpayers. Rochester Hills officials said negotiations to purchase the property will begin immediately.

Individual costs for a proposed citywide trash plan will be released tonight during a solid waste committee meeting at Rochester Hills City Hall.

City councilman Gary Peters, chairman of the committee, said a decision has also been made to replace a proposed bag and tag system with a flat user fee rate. For a single rate, residents will be able to get rid of all trash, recyclables, hazardous waste and composting.

Peters said at the meeting tonight, prices will be released to residents on what the program will cost per household. While not revealing the prices, he did say they're substantially lower than what the "vast majority of residents" are now paying.

The price structure will be broken into two tiers,

with one price for single-home families and a lower price for condominium owners and mobile homes. The meeting starts at 7:30 p.m.

New park fees were set at the Wednesday council meeting, with annual fees staying the same at most parks — and actually going down in some cases.

The price of a daily motor vehicle permit at Bloomer Park went from \$6 to \$5 in the hopes more people will visit the park this year. Mike Hartner, director of parks and forestry, said a number of visitors balked at the park fees last year and actually turned around at the entrance gate.

The city did raise the rates for most soccer and baseball fields because of rising maintenance costs. The council approved the new rates by a 5-2 vote, with members Scot Beaton and Pat Roberts voting no because they thought the new rates were still too high.

Councilman Barnett Jones said Rochester Hills voters might have to consider the possibility of a parks millage, since every year the city is taking an increasing amount from its general fund to subsidize the parks.

The new rates take effect next month, in January 1993.




