OCC: Former trustee 'lived life of commitment'

When David Hackett learned the old military NIKE base was being abandoned, he suggested it be used as a campus for the then-fledgling Oakland Community College.

That was in the 1960s. Now, the OCC Auburn Hills campus boasts a student enrollment of 8,362, the largest of the five-campus system with a



campus sys- Hackett tem with a fall enrollment of 24,296.

Hackett, the longest-serving OCC board trustee, who died Nov. 3 at 82, was honored by the OCC Board of Trustees with a resolution Monday night.

The resolution said Hackett, of Rochester Hills, "lived a life of commitment to his family, his community and the field of education ... remained a staunch advocate of student

and lifelong learning, minority rights, women's rights and the environment."

Trustees also said Hackett "made an indelible and positive impact on the development and growth of this institution."

A retired Detroit school teacher, Hackett and his wife, Marion, raised seven of their own children and two foster children. He was a grandfather and great-grandfather and a U.S. Army veteran who served in World War II.

"He was really one of those people who loved Oakland Community College," said Jan Simmons, a longtime OCC trustee.

"He loved the students. He gave so much. It is a great loss to us."

She said that when Hackett died, "he was doing two things he was committed to." She said the civil rights activist had difficulty walking but went to see Rosa Parks lie in state in Detroit and stood in line until he could pass her casket. Then, he went to the Detroit Institute of Arts.

"He came home and had dinner and went to bed and didn't wake up," Simmons said.

"His wife said he did the things he loved. He could have taught anywhere, but he chose to teach in the inner city of Detroit."

Hackett was appointed to the college's first board to fill a vacancy six months after OCC's establishments in June 1964, said George Cartsonis, OCC spokesman.

He served as board vice chairman from 1990 to 1994 and chairman from 1992 to 1994, when he lost his bid for re-election.

John Wangler, who taught for years at OCC and is now on the board, said he got to know Hackett when he came to OCC in 1967.

"After he got off board, we talked a lot. Whenever I'd see him, he'd say be sure to do well by OCC.

"He's one of a kind, a treehugger in a good sense. He was very environmentally conscious and a pioneer in OCC's beginning and continuation. He really wanted to be sure we preserved Mother Nature. He was very insistent. We had a tree at Orchard Ridge campus, a stately oak. He tried to save it for a long time."

In May, Hackett and the three other surviving OCC charter board members — Lila Jones Johnson, George Mosher and Frederick Chapman — were honored at the college's 40th anniversary scholarship fund-raiser.
