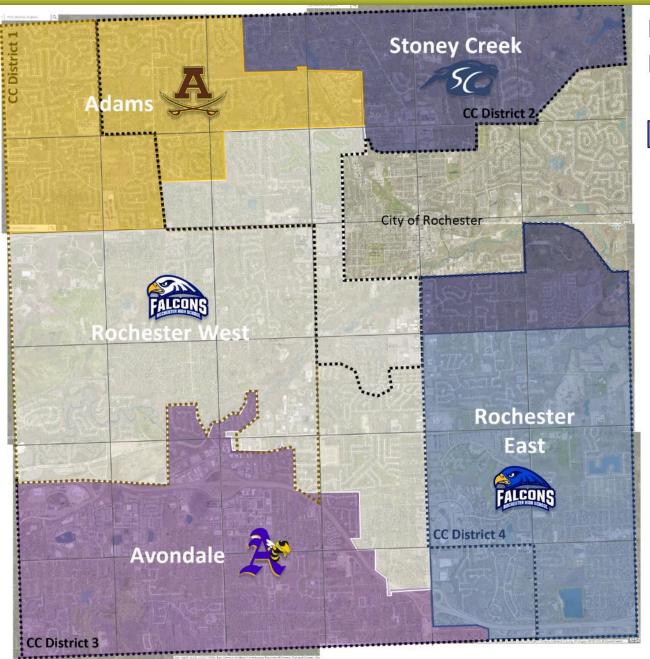

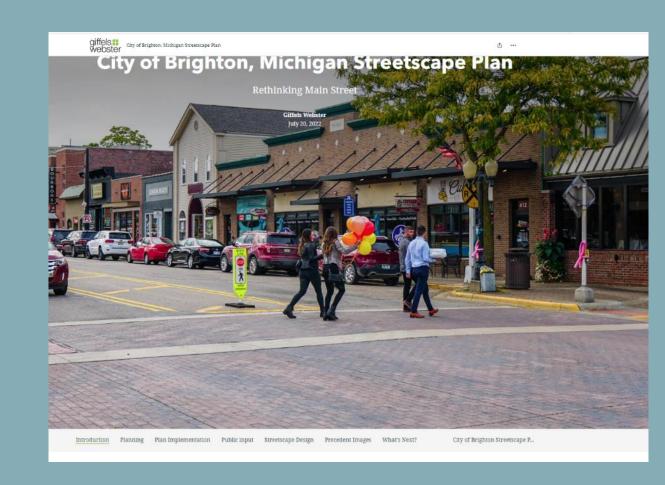

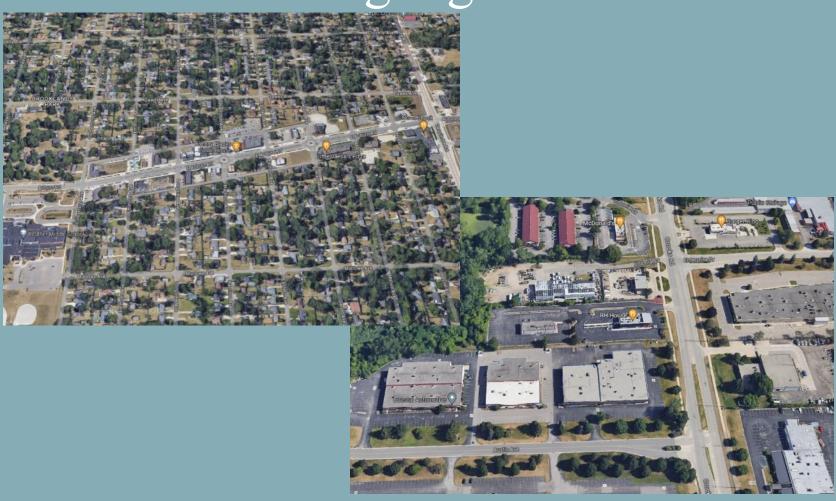


The 2018 Master Plan Update is influenced by the following themes:

Concept: Incorporate placemaking amenities to make this area unique in the region

Example: Creekside Corporate Park - Zionsville, IN

 Traditional office park (500,000 square feet planned) with recreation amenities that connect to the city's trail system

Other Examples of Placemaking Amenities:

- · Distinctive sculptures/art
- · Places to sit, walk, exercise
- Commercial uses support/complement on-site activity, are also open to community
- Connections to regional trail and local pathway systems
- Structured parking preserves land for other uses, provides potential ground-floor space for support retail

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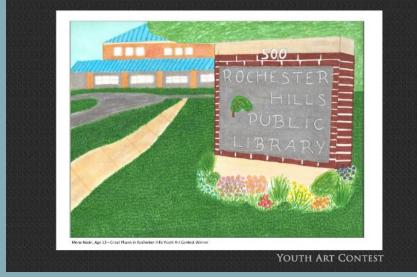

Leadership Visioning

What We Heard from You

- Generally, perceptions of strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, threats and trends were consistent with 2017.
- In some cases, the emphasis changed.

What We Heard from You: Development

- Concerns over "overdevelopment"
- Strain on road network
- Development type and location were also concerns—looking for the right things in the right places
- Loss of open land/green space

What We Heard from You: Open Space

- Generally considered a strength of the city
 - Both parks and general natural environment
- Concern that it is being lost
- If lost, could affect stormwater control
- Concern that loss is tantamount to a loss of city character



What We Heard from You: Traffic

- Traffic remains a top concern/weakness/threat
- A few respondents noted lack of transit as a problem
- Calls for better traffic management
- Need for EV infrastructure



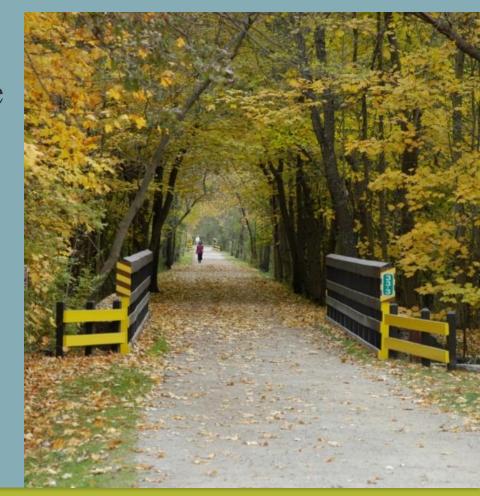
What We Heard from You: Housing & Population

- Concerns with multi-family tied to overdevelopment & traffic concerns
- Concern about aging population
- Some concern about pop. growing too fast
- Others noted MI pop. is not growing
- Concerns about affordability



What We Heard from You: Sustainability

- Concern that growth is not sustainable
- Need to ensure infrastructure keeps pace
- Can green space be maintained even with new development?
- Maintaining fiscal health as city gets older



What We Heard from You: Administration/Community

- Respondents felt city was well-run, to benefit of residents
 - Fiscal responsibility
- City is an example, innovator
- Concern about future changes in leadership
- Customer service, community relations need constant maintenance
- Strong sense of community

What We Heard from You: Trends

In 2017, we had concerns about drones and autonomous vehicles, but tech-based comments focused on EVs and providing charging this time.
